

What is Evaluation?

It is a data-driven process to understand an initiative and its qualities.


It involves collecting data to answer specific questions.

It is planned and purposeful.

It can help inform decisions for the future.

An opportunity to understand more about the initiative, your organization and how you can best serve your community

Monitoring

Collects routine information to ensure activities are done

Focuses on resources and products

Make sure activities are completed on time

Evaluation

Measures the impact of the activities

In-depth assessment of how activities lead to outcomes

Identify recommendations for future planning



Why Conduct an Evaluation?

Determine how activities are being implemented

Drive strategic thinking and decision-making

Justify the value for further funding, resources and support


Refine operations

Engage in continuous quality improvement

Not all evaluations are useful and appropriate

Evaluation Need

Organization

Are the activities changing population health outcomes, hospital infrastructure or policy?

Initiative

Are the activities successful and are they leading to the planned outcomes?

Team

What specifically is working or not working about the activities being done?





When to Evaluate





Evaluation Types

New Initiative

Existing Initiative (Early and Established)

Established Initiative

Established or Completed Initiative

What is feasible, appropriate and necessary for implementing an initiative

Whether and to what extent the initiative is happening as intended

If and to what extent the intended outcomes are being achieved

Degree to which the initiative meets its goal

Formative

Outcome

Impact



Formative Evaluation

When?

During development of new initiative or when an initiative is being adapted to new setting or population

Purpose?

Learn which elements are needed and will be understood and accepted by those involved

Why Perform Formative Evaluation?

Informs modifications before full implementation, sets initiative up for success



Process Evaluation

When?

During operation of existing initiative

Goal?

Learn how well an initiative is working

Why Perform Process Evaluation?

Allows adjustments of ongoing initiatives to promote success, monitor success of initiative activities



Outcome Evaluation

When?

During operation of initiative once it reaches population in which change is intended

Goal?

Measure effect of initiative on intended population

Why Perform
Outcome
Evaluation?

Measure if initiative is meeting its objectives



Impact Evaluation

When?

During operation of initiative or at end of initiative

Goal?

Learn degree to which initiative is meetings its ultimate goal (population level change, infrastructure, sustainability, etc.)

Why Perform Impact Evaluation?

Provides strong evidence to use for policy and funding decisions

Example: Promoting Vaginal Birth

- Create and implement labor management support modules emphasizing reduction of elective cesarean section
- Track each provider's cesarean rates

Evaluation Need

The initiative did not lead to immediate reductions in unnecessary cesarean section birth in its first year. Initiative leaders want to better understand what worked and what did not to improve the initiative the next year.

What Type of Evaluation Fits?

Process Evaluation



Example: Preeclampsia Patient Education

Develop culturally responsive patient education materials about preeclampsia signs and symptoms

Evaluation Need

The initiative designer wants to know what messages, formats and designs of the patient education materials will work for the patient population and what will not work before spending more resources to fully develop the materials.

What Type of Evaluation Fits?

Formative Evaluation



Example: Substance Use Disorder Screening and Referrals

- Screen patients for Substance Use Disorder (SUD)
- Refer patients to additional follow-up services
- Conduct trainings on SUD to clinical staff on protocols and trauma-informed approaches to SUD

Evaluation Need

The initiative wants to learn about if and how the benefits are reaching disproportionately impacted populations and use this information to make rapid improvements while the initiative is being implemented.






High rates of hypertensive disorders in pregnancy

Need for QI calls for extra support


QI Initiative

- Hold 2 face-to-face meetings and 18 monthly 1-hour collaborative learning webinars.
- Collect, report and monitor data on patients with severe hypertension using the web-based data system.
- Use QI strategies to test and implement protocols to recognize, prevent, respond and learn from cases of severe hypertension.
- Initiate QI calls with hospitals that needed additional support.
- Develop a toolkit and a webinar series.



Evaluation can look into what QI may have missed

QI Initiative



QI RESULTS:

- The percentage of women with sustained new-onset severe hypertension receiving medication within 60 minutes rose from 41% to 87%.
- The overall rate of severe pregnancy complications and maternal deaths within 1 year of pregnancy decreased from 12% to 8%.



Process Evaluation



Evaluation can assess long-term outcomes and impacts

QI Initiative



QI RESULTS:

- The percentage of women with sustained new-onset severe hypertension receiving medication within 60 minutes rose from 41% to 87%.
- The overall rate of severe pregnancy complications and maternal deaths within 1 year of pregnancy decreased from 12% to 8%.

Inform the next QI cycle




